The Ambulance responded to yet another record-breaking number of calls for service in February with 51 calls for service. As February is our shortest month our call volume generally falls below 40. 20 of those calls were to the ski center, and a majority of calls falling on the weekend days. Yet again, many thanks to our weekend crews and backup responders, and to the Fire and Police Departments that assisted us during some of our more complex emergencies.

Another bit of gratitude is extended to our recently retired Paramedic and Deputy Chief James Coddington. Chief Coddington retired last week from our Agency, and is looking forward to a relaxing future with his lovely wife Beth. The relaxation is well deserved, as Chief Coddington has been a NYS Certified Paramedic practicing in the field for more than 25 years. He was instrumental in assisting our Ambulance Service during re-organization about 15 years ago during his tenure as Chief of New Paltz Rescue Squad, and has saved countless lives in his tenure both here and elsewhere. Chief Coddington we wish you the best in your future rest and relaxation- and you will always be a member of our EMS family.

COVID UPDATE- Following the last meeting Councilmember Kneissl brought up a very important and valid point about the COVID numbers provided every month within this report. The numbers provided monthly have come from the Ulster County COVID-19 dashboard, which provided up to date REPORTED cases to the County. This method proved very reliable in the beginning of the Pandemic, however after the advent of home testing it is nearly impossible to have 100% visibility of positive COVID cases affecting our Town. Do all people report their positive case? Well of course not (although they should). In a bit of irony, the County has seemingly discontinued the dashboard as the link goes to the State site. In turn, we will discontinue the reporting as well - after all I'm rather certain we've all had enough of it! Lets hope we don't have to worry about it ever again!

Shandaken Historical Museum Report for February 2023

Among our 36 visitors this month is our new friend and volunteer Liam. He has returned repeatedly and is volunteering his time working at the museum. He's a great help and our next project will be setting up an eBay account so the museum can find buyers for the donated items that are not part of Shandaken history. Many of which are books and postcards. Liam is a blessing; we'll miss him when he graduates this year and goes off to college.

We're still sharing our history online and have quite a few followers. We also received a five star review this month from Sam F. after giving them a tour.

WE have many ongoing projects via email as well. Author Dennis Dickinson is writing a book about the artwork of Gerald Cassidy, a painter who was commissioned by Walter G. Crump to do a portrait of Rip Van Winkle. We are helping him gather information on the painting. Another local artist, Gail Freund, simply requires help by sharing images of local farms for her to paint. A visit from Sandra Gambetti, a professor in handwriting and documentation needs images of old documents written in cursive\script to teach in her classes. Marcy Brownstein would like a history\property search on the Kingston Trust

Savings Bank in Phoenicia. Our friend Chris Van Kleek, historian for the Winnisook Club sent me a video of Oliverea right after hurricane Irene hit. Last but not least with the help of Jane Rossitz and Mark Bedell I was able to help Tess Chawi locate her Grandparents old home in Oliverea, the Webb home and "Gypsy Cottage" where they stayed when visiting. The bundles of newspapers have been sorted and the Rossitz family with the help of Mark Bedell will bring us more recorded history soon. Catskill Mountain Newspapers are only archived from 1902 – 1973, so this is an important task, many Rossitz bundles are dated after 1973 also the Newspaper is no longer in print as of January 2020.

Again we're looking forward to some fun in June the weekend of the 23rd is when our Metal Detecting friends will return for our fundraiser for the Shandaken Historical Museum.
