# Month of April 2015

Phoenicia Water: Another month of multiple main breaks has passed and the Water District has been addressing these breaks as quickly and efficiently as possible as they occur. Concerning the High Street connection, in the middle of last month a temporary line was connected across the Bridge Street Bridge and has been working fine providing potable water to those residents. It looks like we are close to meeting the necessary goals of respondents to the income Survey to allow us to proceed shortly in applying for the grants necessary for the system upgrades. After meeting with Candace Balmer from RCAP Solutions, who is assisting us in applying for these grants, we have a few options that need to be resolved in order for us to proceed. We believe the High Street Loop from the Woodland Valley Bridge would be well within the limit of the grant amount and could be accomplished much faster as the plans are already drawn up and have previously been stamped approved by the Ulster County Department of Health. The Bridge Street Bridge is estimated at the grant funding limit and would require starting from scratch with survey work, creation of construction drawings and documents and required DOH approval. USDA has now informed us that either job would require a Federal Environmental review along with additional investigations. Ultimately the Bridge Street Bridge would be quicker for them to expedite because it would be a straight replacement of an existing condition. The High St. Loop would require a lengthier review period as it would be a new connection. The USDA understood the benefit and pitfalls with either review and were going to contact us early this week as to whether they could expedite the High Street Loop review. Once we have an answer to this we would hope to hold several meetings this month to move whichever project is selected to move forward to the construction process. We have a resolution tonight to set up multiple meetings for the Town Board to address this as quickly as possible. We will select several dates, but may not need them in which case we would simply cancel the meeting as soon as we know. What it does do is allow us several opportunities to address this as efficiently as we can. These meetings will be dedicated solely to addressing Water District issues and grant opportunities. We will continue to make every effort to have one of these jobs completed prior to Memorial Day.

Ambulance: In January it was noted at our meeting that our oldest ambulance unit a 2006 Ford is quickly deteriorating. We have been facing mounting costs associated with repairs to the vehicle. The ambulance was due to be replaced next year, but needs to be replaced as soon as possible. The Ambulance Chief has provided specification documents for a replacement ambulance. We anticipate the cost of this ambulance to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The last ambulance we purchased five years ago, which is running fine, came in at \$125,000 and after bonding the cost we paid our last payment on that vehicle this year. We would again look to bond the cost of the replacement ambulance over either a four or five year term. The term will depend on what the bids come in at minus any revenue we can generate from auction of the 2006 ambulance. The Chief feels confident that the current vehicle could retrieve \$7-10,000 at auction. We will be going out to bid tonight

Miscellaneous: With the assistance of the Highway Superintendent, we will be awarding the gravel crushing bid as advertised since last month. We also have resolutions concerning support for the Woodstock Women's Cycling Grand Prix, which we saw a presentation on last month and for a Mobile Spay and Neuter Clinic to be set up at Town Hall on upcoming Saturdays.

Pine Hill 20/20: Following a seminar I attended last month conce opportunities for Main Streets throughout the region, Eric and I would like to reinvestigate the options for Pine Hill. A few years ago the Town started a process through CWC to provide upgrades for Main Street in Pine Hill. Eric and I have made several attempts to progress this and another project handled by the firm hired back in 2008 to no avail. We have discussed this with the CWC and are exploring our options on how to best proceed. Those issues do not preclude us from asking for volunteers from the Hamlet of Pine Hill to join the Pine Hill 20/20 Visioning Committee. This committee, made of Hamlet residents, homeowners and business owners, would help to create a vision of what they would like to see for the Hamlet and to move toward implementation of any outcomes from these sessions. This committee would help to create oversight and ensure continued activity to complete any and all options by the year 2020. Tonight we start the process of advertising for hids for the replacement of our nearly ten year old ambulance. This replacement follows an established replacement cycle for vehicles. Because of the existance of this cycle we were able to get an additional two years of service from the current Ambulance. The vehicle specified is a no frills workhorse type of vehicle that is modeled after the previous vehicle purchased in 2010 except for the chassis. This is also the last piece to complete the standardization of our fleet which cuts employee training and familiarization time down. This ambulance will come at a cost significantly less than the 2010 purchase, as it is not four wheel drive. As the vehicle specified is a Ford product we will receive a significant discount towards the chassis. As the Town of Shandaken operates more than \$4,000 off the total chassis price. Our current vehicle that this Ambulance is replacing has served us well, but as was the case with vehicles in the past it is showing its age-costing many thousands of dollars to keep in service and malfunctioning monthly if not more frequently.

In addition to the cost savings of the chassis and fleet discount the Ambulance Service is planning to follow the lead of the Highway Department and surplus the 2006 Ambulance through an auction service. This has proven to be a very effective way of getting the most for surplus equipment per a variety of sources. As trade in value for ambulances decreases significantly in ambulance vehicles with greater than 100,000 miles it is the feeling of many that would be a prudent move following the acquisition of the new ambulance. In addition to the actual vehicle, the Ambulance department has other surplus equipment from replacements and upgrades that Tonight we start the process of advertising for hids for the replacement of our nearly ten
